Climate legislation is in everyone's best interest

Thank you for publishing Wayne Dunn's op-ed article which explained why "Urgently addressing climate change is in every person's self interest."

Yes, climate change action is in the interest of parents and grandparents who want to protect their children from extreme rainstorms (made more intense by climate change) that lead to deadly floods.

Climate change action doesn't appear to be in the interest of coal mine owners who oppose carbon emissions limits. It's in the interest of other outdoor workers (like construction workers, postal, police, house painters, landscapers, etc.), and sports enthusiasts (skiers, fishermen, hunters, golfers, pick-up basketball players).
