David Ignatius wrote about Americans having trouble assessing if facts are reliable. This is critical to well-working democracy which needs an informed and empowered citizenry.

Ignatius mentioned climate change as one example of Americans not accepting facts. The Yale Climate Communication Center reported in October 2017: Although 54 percent of Americans (correctly) understand global warming is mostly human-caused, 33 percent (wrongly) say it's due mostly to natural changes.

Why so uncertain when more than 90 percent of climate scientists agree? When I began volunteering on climate change, I found on-line information was confusing. Two websites looked alike, talked alike, but reached opposite conclusions. Eventually I learned the Guardian.co.uk newspaper (free on-line), presents reliable climate articles, using language that non-scientists (like me) can understand.

Only 38 percent of Americans say they discuss global warming with family and friends "often" or "occasionally." Most "rarely" or "never" discuss it (62 percent).

How is good information transmitted if people who understand climate don't discuss it with family or friends? I used to avoid discussing climate because I didn't want conflict. Eventually, I found it easier to discuss climate with strangers: I would say one quick sentence at a display counter or checkout line. Store employees must be polite; talking to them was good practice and helped me feel comfortable sharing information.

Although 48 percent of Americans say humans could reduce global warming, they also say it's unclear whether we'll do what's necessary. And 25 percent say we won't reduce global warming because people are unwilling to change behaviors. Avoid being a downer. Read optimistic, trustworthy information about climate, and clean energy at <u>Bloomberg.com</u>.

Add to your optimism by volunteering. There are tons of different climate groups--Democratic, Republican, libertarian. Find one that helps you feel empowered. Tell everyone about the group.
