Bobby Jindal produced an interesting letter ordering the President of the United States to refrain from speaking about climate change while in New Orleans. Ben Carson wouldn't be interested that scientists have proved that our changing climate is caused by humans, even if God sent an angel from heaven with tablets saying "Ben, climate change is real and your fossil fuels are causing it."

The only interesting Republicans are a group of 11 Republican representatives who sponsored a resolution last week acknowledging our extreme weather events and urging Congress to take action.
