Ironically, the <u>Chicago Sun</u> recently published a commentary by <u>Jim Owens</u>, former CEO and chairman of Caterpillar, maker of heavy equipment, including farm tractors, in which Owens announced he has just joined the Risky Business Project, led by former Secretary of the Treasury <u>Hank Paulson</u>, former New York Mayor <u>Mike</u> <u>Bloomberg</u> and hedge fund manager and environmentalist <u>Tom</u> <u>Steyer</u>. Owens asked other business leaders to join him because climate change presents a big threat to businesses in the Midwest.

I hope local residents urge local businesses to contact Congress in support of national legislation to cut emissions. National policies will help everyone and it will prevent people worrying about businesses moving out of state.
